At the beginning of this year, the Djarragun College Gordonvale Campus officially merged with the Cape York Girl Academy at Wangetti and in February, the Gordonvale Campus hosted the first Djarragun College Board meeting of the year in the Hub Gallery. I am so proud to relay that our Board members were extremely impressed to be welcomed by our Certificate III Hospitality students, who had prepared an amazing array of lunchtime treats for them. Headed by Ms Alison Conroy, the standard of our Hospitality students' catering was simply outstanding.

I am pleased to see that students, on the whole, have been complying well with our long-standing expectations of wearing closed-in shoes and leaving mobile phones in their bag or in the classroom mobile phone bag during class time. This really does show respect for learning as well as for fellow students and staff at the College.

There have been a number of approved capital works at the Gordonvale Campus and works commenced this term on the extension to Girls' Boarding. Sport Returns in 2022!

There are 4 core modules where students learn about their own identity in an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander context, that are delivered in conjunction with an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander representative. It is important to have Indigenous staff when delivering these modules, as we can draw on prior knowledge and experience as well as being culturally appropriate in the course content and its delivery of culturally sensitive information.

The course has been extremely popular amongst our cohort of talented young artists.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION NEWS



With around 20 programs on scope in VET - more than any other school around the Cairns region - it has been a busy beginning to the year.

Jomella Kabai, Linda Solomon and Japheth Wosomo were accepted into the 3 day Navy Work Experience program. The intense training course took place at HMAS Cairns Navy Base in Portsmith.

The program consisted of just 12 students from different high schools in the Cairns area. Whilst on placement, the students participated in a sea and survival course, including riding on jet boats in the Cairns Inlet, a practical life rafting safety session in the swimming pool and a physical test. To emphasise how well our students did, they were the only 3 to successfully complete the Navy Physical Readiness Test! Although they each agreed this was the hardest part of the course as it consisted of push-ups, sit-ups and either running or swimming. Each of our students received very positive feedback from the program coordinators and strong encouragement to apply to join at the end of Year 12.





The Certificate II Hospitality students ran a mini café out of their classroom, K4, offering a range of espresso coffees, health drinks, smoothies, milkshakes and iced coffees and chocolates. K4 Café was a great experience as the students expanded their repertoire in café style beverages. They were also introduced to using a cash register and EFTPOS for the first time.

In Certificate III Early Childhood Education & Care, students have been developing new activities so that they have some ideas to support a child's learning development. One example is students making a playdough using materials that are safe for the children. The learning objective of this is to support a child's physical development.

Ms Karina Nerot took a group of students from the trades area for a 'Breaky with the Tradies' excursion. The breakfast is an annual event held by the Business Liaison Association (BLA) at the Cairns TAFE. This was a fantastic opportunity for our trades students to find out more information from actual workers from a variety of trade areas and to hear their own stories about their careers in the industry.

Looking ahead to next term there are a number of excursions planned for VET students. The Department of Transport will also be coming out to the College to conduct the Queensland Learner Driver written test with interested students over the age of 16yrs.

We have work experience opportunities coming up for our Year 10-12 students. Students that participate in work experience increase their self-understanding, maturity, independence and self-confidence. It helps to increase motivation to continue their study and gives them a better understanding of what work life is like compared to attending school. It also gives students the chance to gain hands-on experience, to see what they like and don't like, then plan for their future. A great opportunity.

BOARDERS' NEWS

I would like to introduce myself to the Djarragun community. My name is Dan Niemerg and I began this year in the role of Residential Principal. My responsibilities include overseeing the entire residential program on the Djarragun and Girl Academy campuses. I come with over 20 years of experience in education.

Term 1 saw many challenges, which started with the COVID-19 looming over our heads. Boarding students worked under a strict testing regime where boarders were tested daily before school and those who tested positive were quickly isolated in an area in boarding that was purposely prepared. Activities were limited to places away from the general public in the first few weeks of the term when the Cairns area outbreak was at its peak. As a result of the COVID-19 challenges we saw many students not return for the start of the school year. Many of those not returning were supplied education packs to provide that opportunity to keep moving forward.

The activity program included wellbeing support for students in the form of the Respect Me program, which targeted Senior students. Students also participated in weekly sports including volleyball on Wednesday evenings and swimming on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Often, students also attended the local community youth group on Friday evenings, which was built around Christian values and fun activities. This proved to be a very popular way for students to wind down the week that was.

The Rabbitohs came up to Cairns and played against the Cowboys earlier in the term and our students had tickets for that, as well as tickets to the Taipans game later in the term. There were many trips to the local beaches including Ellis Beach and Etty Bay, as well as weekends spent in the sun on the Esplanade. Some of the exciting paid activities that students enjoyed included 10 pin bowling, cinema trips, Laser Tag, and swimming at the Aqua Park.

We also said farewell to a few supervisors this term, including Eddie Daniel, Casey Meager, Noela Millican, Patrick Ranasinge and Wade Munro. We wish them well in their future endeavours and thank them for their service to the students of Djarragun College.

Next term we are expecting to see many of our boarders returning who were held up from COVID-19 restrictions in their home communities.





