### A Season of Growth, Unity and Progress

As we conclude Term 2 at Djarragun College, I reflect with pride on the remarkable achievements, relationships and experiences that have shaped these past ten weeks across our Gordonvale and Wangetti campuses.

This term has been characterised by strong student engagement, cultural connection, and academic momentum. We saw outstanding participation in cornerstone events like ANZAC Day, Reconciliation Week, and our much-loved Athletics Carnival, where Waru House took the lead in spirited competition and community celebration. These events not only showcased student talent and pride but reinforced our values of respect, remembrance, and belonging.

In our Primary School, students embraced literacy and learning through Mother's Day crafts, National Simultaneous Storytime, road safety programs, and excursions like Ratburger at the theatre. Breathing exercises, bush tucker lessons, and reflections for National Sorry Day highlighted how wellbeing and cultural identity are embedded in learning.

Middle and Senior students have continued to thrive through academic exploration and real-world experiences. From voice-controlled robots in the Deadly Coders program, to persuasive writing in English, to JCU's Bio Tech Day and STEM excursions — curiosity and critical thinking have been nurtured across all year levels. In Vocational Education, students are flourishing through their success in learner licensing, work placements, and excursions to Norweld, John Holland, and Crystalbrook Flynn. Mable Cedric, Peter Levi, and others are already carving meaningful post-school pathways.

Our Boarding program has shown significant development. Boys' Boarding saw strong attendance, reduced disruptions, and enriched cultural activities, with highlights including mentoring from Kunjur Men's Group and the successful parent-teacher evening.

The girls' boarding house marked its first term in over four years without physical incidents — a testament to the work being done to create emotionally safe, responsive spaces. Integrating boarding staff into classrooms this term has strengthened continuity between home and school, a change warmly welcomed by students.

At the Cape York Girl Academy, Term 2 was marked by deep learning, cultural pride, and joyful connection. From creative cooking sessions and hospitality training at Birrgal, to science experiments, outdoor adventures and artistic development, the program continues to reflect the strength of relationships and the potential of every girl. The teaching team is to be commended for sustaining a high-quality, trauma-informed learning environment that honours each student's story and future.

Finally, we welcomed Nicole Clemesha as our new Associate Principal. Nicole brings extensive leadership experience, particularly in working with Aboriginal students and students with disability, and has already begun forging strong connections within our community.

As we prepare for the move into our new Boys' Boarding facility in Term 3, I extend my heartfelt thanks to all staff, families, Elders and community partners who have contributed to another powerful term of growth. Your commitment is what enables Djarragun College to continue shaping futures with courage, care and high expectations.

Term 2 has been full of exciting learning adventures across our Primary classes!






It's been a wonderful term of learning, discovery and fun in Primary!



### **VOCATIONAL EDUCATION NEWS**

Learner License Success On 30 May, fifteen students proudly passed their Learner License written test held on campus. All students were successful and are now able to visit the Department of Transport with their identification to officially receive their licenses. This achievement not only marks a milestone in their personal growth but also launches them into a new phase of independence and responsibility.

As young drivers prepare to take on the road, it is important to recognise the risks involved. Statistics show that young drivers aged 16-24 account for a quarter of all driver fatalities in Queensland, despite only representing 13.7% of the driving population. These risks are due to inexperience, risky behaviours, and developmental factors. As our students transition into solo driving, we continue to encourage safe and responsible road habits.

Norweld Industry Visit Mr Brydon and ten Certificate II in Engineering students had the opportunity to tour Norweld, a local company known for their custom-fabricated aluminium trays and canopies. Guided by Special Projects Director, Isaac Edmiston, students witnessed the full production process and were inspired by Isaac's career journey, which began with an adult apprenticeship. The hands-on experience and industry insight gave students a deeper understanding of career possibilities in fabrication and engineering.

Early Childhood Success On 26 May, Mable Cedric began her paid role at Yarrabah Childcare, working in the baby/toddler room. Having already completed her Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care, Mable has impressed the centre's director, Sharon, who hopes to welcome her full-time next year. Mable plans to begin her Diploma in Early Education Studies later this year. Her dedication is a shining example of how early training can lead to meaningful employment opportunities.

Emerging Educators Peter Levi is already making strides toward his dream of becoming an artist and educator. Recently, he was seen leading a weaving session during Reconciliation Week, patiently teaching and sharing his cultural knowledge with others. His natural leadership and calm instruction showed a glimpse of the teacher he is becoming.

John Holland Industry Presentation On 14 May, representatives from John Holland presented to our senior students about the vast career opportunities in the construction infrastructure industry. With current projects upgrades from Edmonton including Gordonvale, Palmerston Highway restoration, and a new water treatment facility in Gordonvale, students gained valuable insight into the scope of careers available locally. A special thanks to the engaging team from John Holland who offered an informative and interactive session, complete with a pop quiz and goodies!



















Crystalbrook Hospitality Excursion Certificate II in Hospitality students enjoyed an exciting excursion to Crystalbrook Flynn Hotel. Hosted by Tracie Picton, students toured the luxury facilities, kitchen areas, and restaurants while gaining career insights from the head chef. A delicious lunch at Boardwalk Social followed, and students later visited TAFE to explore their commercial training kitchens, IT-cyber facilities, beauty salons, and more. This was an inspiring day filled with real-world learning.

Mr Will led students on multiple bush walks and paddling sessions on the Freshwater River. ### ANZAC Day-lest we forget

On Thursday 24 April, Primary and Secondary students came together in the Auditorium to commemorate ANZAC Day with a small service led by our Student Captains and Leaders. ANZAC Day falls on 25 April each year and marks the anniversary of the first major battle fought by Australian and New Zealand soldiers during the First World War. A time to remember and appreciate the sacrifice made by those soldiers in service of their country.

Students learned that the word "ANZAC" stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. On 25 April 1915, soldiers from Australia and New Zealand — called Anzacs — landed at Gallipoli in Turkey in a brave mission that would become a defining moment in their history. Arriving in the early hours of the morning, the Anzacs fought under tough conditions for nearly eight months, and many made the ultimate sacrifice during the campaign.

We were honored to be addressed by special guests, Warrant Officer Jerry Savage and Corporal Monalita Viliamu from the Australian Defence Force Indigenous Specialist Recruitment Team. We warmly thank them for their service, their visit, and the opportunity to reflect together on the brave men and women who fought to keep us safe.

















# Watch Out – Cane Trains About

The 2025 cane crushing season commenced in June and MSF Sugar would like to remind families of the dangers of children playing on or near cane trains and railway tracks.

Cane trains carry very large loads and have limited ability to brake suddenly, and children often don't realise the danger they put themselves in when they jump on to moving cane trains, play around railway tracks, ride trail bikes along the cane railway and even fish from cane railway bridges.

Occasionally children are seen playing with the track points that guide the train from one track to another or placing objects on the line. This is extremely dangerous as it can cause the train to derail and result in serious injury or death.

Trains operate on the extensive private cane railway network 24 hours per day during the cane crushing season.

#### Please make your children aware to stay safe and remember:

- Stay away from locomotives and cane bins.
- Don't play around railway lines.
- Never walk between cane bins.
- Never go on to a cane railway bridge.
- Never walk behind a train the driver will not see you.
- If you have to cross the railway tracks, STOP and look both ways, LISTEN and only cross when it is safe.
- OBEY Flashing Lights signals and Give Way signage at road crossings.


